

Minutes of the Athy Municipal District Meeting
Held on Monday, 27th January 2015 at 10.00 a.m.
at Rathstewart Athy

Vote of Sympathy

The Cathaoirleach commenced the meeting by expressing condolences to the families of the young victims of the tragic traffic accident that took place in the area on the 6th January 2015. He referred to the Books of Condolence that were opened in Athy and Naas and extended heartfelt sympathy of all the members to the families and community. All the members present wished to be associated with this expression of sympathy and they also paid tribute to the emergency services and Fr. McEvoy who attended at the scene. The meetings administrator also concurred with the members sentiments on behalf of the staff of the Council.

AY1/115 Confirmation of Minutes

The members considered the minutes of the monthly meeting held on 15th December 2015.

Resolved on the proposal of Councillor Wall, seconded by Councillor Redmond that the minutes be confirmed and taken as read.

Matters Arising

Car Park, Kildangan

Councillor Wall thanked the traffic management section for the car park design and hoped that progress will be made on providing a car park for area as soon as possible.

Abbeylands Estate Castledermot - Traffic Congestion

Resolved that the roads and transportation section will consult with the Municipal District Office with a view to preparing a traffic calming scheme if considered suitable and will update members at next meeting.

Bus Stop - Monasterevin

Resolved that the roads and transportation section will update the members at next meeting.

Skatepark

In response to a query from Councillor Redmond as to when the skatepark will be officially opened, the District Engineer advised this has been referred to roads design to check connectivity to existing infrastructure.

Resolved that the members will kept updated on progress.

Oak Park

The members were advised that cash has been lodged in lieu of this bond. Mr. Dunne also informed the meeting that the Council is working with Irish Water to come to a resolution on this matter. Councillor Keatley asked if the Council had heard from the ESB as this issue as it could be easily resolved if the ESB was paid for. He reiterated that this issue needs to be resolved as a matter of urgency.

Resolved to keep the members informed on progress.

AY2/115 HSE Briefing on Ambulance Services

The Cathaoirleach and members welcomed Mr. Tom Horwell from the Ambulance Service who gave a overview on the response times and services provided in the Athy and surrounding areas. He also referred to the tragic accident that occurred in

the area recently and advised that he had debriefed the incident officer on duty at that time. He updated the members on the available personnel to Athy and the high range of skills and training involved, rosters, front line duties and difficulties they sometimes encounter in providing the service e.g. overtime, training costs. He also advised that they cover patients going to Naas and the Midlands Hospitals. In response to members queries, Mr. Horwell also outlined how issues such as waiting times in hospitals, response times etc are dealt with and referred to the introduction of Intermediate Care which helps free up emergency crews. He advised that there are always exceptions that may arise in emergency situations however the ambulance service should not be held up for more than one hour at a hospital and it is investigated rigorously if it is any longer. The Cathaoirleach thanked Mr. Horwell for his attendance and briefing and in response Mr. Horwell advised that he can be contacted at any time if the members had further queries and he withdrew from the meeting.

AY3/115 Southern Distributor Road

Ms. Clodagh Lyons, Executive Engineer advised the members that she had been appointed late last year to oversee this project. She advised that she had gone through the procurement process and a new consultant will be in place towards the end of March this year. The consultants will review the project as part of the tendering process and come up with a programme of delivery. She further advised that some updates will be required and they will take a few months. She hoped that by next year we would have gone through route selection, environmental services, have looked at design and be going to An Bord Pleanala with an Environmental Impact Statement. She anticipated that the summer would be a realistic timescale.

The members welcomed Ms. Lyons and congratulated her on her new appointment. In response to a query from Councillor Redmond, Ms. Lyons said that she had been given a brief to look at the Southern Distributor Road but this will be reviewed again by the consultants to ensure that it is the proper relief route and that all planning and development in the area including a proposed investment in the area would have an impact on the route and that the proposed route will alleviate traffic in the town .

Councillor Wall enquired as to why the northern distributor road would be considered if the brief is to concentrate on the southern distributor road. In response, Ms. Lyons advised that although work is currently concentrating on the southern side of the town, it is not possible to anticipate the expert opinion of the consultants once appointed. A discussion ensued with several members expressing dismay that the northern route would be even considered at this stage. Mr. Coppinger advised that all routes must be looked at in an even handed manner taking into context planning, national and local plans. He said that he would be surprised if a different route was decided on as ten years of work had gone into the Southern route however the statutory process must be adhered to which is why consultants are to be appointed and it will be the summer before there is a clearer view. In response to the Cathaoirleach's fears that the project would be set back ten years, Mr. Coppinger confirmed that although we have a process to go through, this project is treated with the highest priority and reassured the members that there would be no delay as there are timescales to be met.

Resolved that the item remain on the agenda for update and that delivery of this project be expedited.

AY4/115 Update on Community and Economic Development Issues

This item was discussed at a meeting held on Friday 23rd January and is to be followed up with a further meeting this week.

Resolved as this item is now a standing item on the agenda that there will be an update at the next meeting.

AY5/115 Speed Limit Bye Law for the R448

Mr. Duff referred to the report previously circulated to the members advising of the statutory procedure for the making of a Road Traffic Special Speed Limit Bye Law for the R448 at Prumplestown/Knocknagee, Castledermot and advised the members that although it is a reserved function of the Council, the approval of the municipal district is required to bring it to full Council. The speed limit bye law has been through a public consultation and no objections have been received save for consultation with the gardai.

In response to a query from Councillor Keatley, Mr. Duff confirmed that although the Road Safety Officer did not have a statutory input into the process like the gardai, he would have considered it.

Resolved on the proposal of Councillor Keatley, seconded by Councillor Wall that the Speed Limit Bye Law for the R448 as outlined in the report be forwarded to full Council for approval.

AY6/115 Naming of Online Service Station on M9

The members considered the following motion in the name of Councillor Miley:

That the council request the NRA to call the new proposed online service station on the M9 the Ernest Shackleton Station.

The members considered a report from the roads and transportation section advising that if the members are in agreement then a written request will be issued to the National Roads Authority (NRA).

Councillor Miley stated that although the station was not initially welcomed he felt that it should be named the Ernest Shackleton Service Station which would entice people to visit the southern part of the County and we should write to the NRA in this regard.

Councillor Keatley expressed concern that this station would affect business in the area by naming it Ernest Shackleton and felt the junction in Mullaghmast would be more suitable.

Councillor Redmond felt it was appropriate as it would be an opportunity to turn South Kildare into Shackleton County similar to Yeats County in Sligo and would boost tourism in the area.

Although Councillor Dalton felt the station was surplus to requirements and the funding should have been used elsewhere in the south of the County, he said that naming it after Ernest Shackleton was a worthwhile idea. He asked if we could

widen this and encourage a Shackleton theme with the involvement of Kildare Failte and the Council especially if this is the only point for motorists to stop in south Kildare. Both the Cathaoirleach and Councillor Keatley concurred with this and felt we should also engage with the Ernest Shackleton Committee in Athy first to get their input into how best to encourage people into the south of the county.

Councillor Wall had concerns about how this project will affect local business and queried how this could be marketed and how tourists could be enticed to the birthplace of Shackleton in Kilkea and develop the whole Shackleton experience in Athy. His concern was that tourists would only visit the station and drive on rather than getting them into Athy.

Resolved that a meeting be set up with the Council, Kildare Failte and the Ernest Shackleton Committee to consider how best to promote the Ernest Shackleton experience with a view to attracting people to the south of the County incorporating the naming of the new service station on the M9.

AY7/115 Public Transport in South of the County

It was agreed to consider items 7, 8, and 9 on the agenda together.

Item 7 - Motion Councillor Wall

That the Athy Municipal District call on the Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport to immediately provide an adequate and sustained public transport network for the residents living near the M9/N9, in particular those living in the villages along these routes.

Item 8 - Motion - Councillor Keatley

That the council commit to a strategy of installing bus stops in the south of the county at recognised collection points for public and private operators.

Item 9 - Motion Councillor Miley

That the council call on the National Transport Authority, Bus Eireann and the Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport, Paschal O Donohoe to ensure that there is a proper bus service in place for the villages of Castledermot, Moone, Timolin, Ballitore, Crookstown, Kilgowan and all places in between.

A report from the roads and transportation section was circulated to the members advising that the system in relation to public transport buses (public and commercial) is that public transport providers apply to the National Transport Authority (NTA) for a licence which sets out the route and the drop off/pick up points. The public transport providers must then apply to Kildare County Council for permission to site and install the bus stop (Section 16 of the Road Traffic Act 2002). The public transport providers provide the required signage and install it in accordance with Kildare County Council's requirements. With regard to Councillor Keatley's motion – if the recognised collection points to which he refers are designated bus stops then signage should be provided by the public transport provider. It should be noted that this report refers only to bus stops – if a bus shelter is required then a planning application must be lodged by the public transport provider. If the members are in agreement a letter will be issued to the Minister, to the National Transport Authority (NTA) and to Bus Eireann.

Councillor Miley said it was vital that the south of the County be provided with an adequate bus service and felt that it was important to get Bus Eireann to service this route again especially with J. J. Kavanagh pulling his service from this route. He said it is a vital service for students and the elderly in our community who are unable to use their free travel. He welcomed the help of the Rural Transport Authority in the County but felt that a letter should issue to the Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport in this regard. Councillor Wall referred to a public meeting in Castledermot held to consider the need to link it to various towns as the lack of service is a serious concern for the people there. He felt the whole issue here relates to subsidising the transport and we have to look to Bus Eireann to come on board. He said that Deputy Wall had contacted the Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport and a meeting has been arranged. He also advised that the Rural Transport Authority will help in the interim. He referred to the 7 services that go from Waterford to Dublin daily but only 1 or 2 go through Castledermot and this is where the focus needs to be. Councillor Keatley concurred with the two previous members and said that the decline of the service has happened progressively over the last 10 years. He referred to the meeting with the Minister organised by both Deputy Wall and Deputy Heydon and asked that bus stop issues be discussed at this meeting as he did not

feel that one provider should be paying for a bus stop. He felt that this can only be resolved by setting up a rural transport link making the route economically viable with realistic options, with viable pulling in points for express routes along the old M9 and follow up with more stops at local level too. He welcomed the meeting with the Minister and reiterated the need for a cohesive policy with due regard for the safety element too and asked that this issue be referred to the SPC for consideration also

Mr. O'Flaherty said that bus providers must apply for permission to erect bus shelters and it must be looked at by both the public service provider and the Council and in a coherent way. It is not the remit of the Council to provide bus shelters. He said however that there has been an indication from the NTA that there may be funding available for bus shelters, however the Council will need to have a strategy as to where to locate shelters and where numbers warrant them.

Resolved to write to the Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport, the Minister for Rural Affairs, the NTA, and Bus Eireann requesting a meeting to discuss provision of services for the south of the County. Also to refer this matter to the Transport Strategic Policy Committee for consideration and roads and transportation to advise members on preferred locations for bus shelters.

AY8/115 update on pedestrian bridge over River Barrow

The member considered the following question in the name of Councillor Redmond. Can we as a council get an update as to the pedestrian bridge over the River Barrow in the urban Athy area? It's delivery will be the first bridge build over the Barrow for over 200 years locally.

A report from the roads and transportation section was circulated to the members advising that a Feasibility Report in respect of this project was completed a number of years ago and was funded by the National Transport Authority (NTA).

Subsequently an Options Report was completed. The project has not progressed since then. The next step is for the Municipal District Engineer (who is managing this project) to meet with the members to discuss the potential location for the footbridge.

Councillor Redmond welcomed the report. Mr. O'Flaherty advised that it is necessary to decide in general terms where we go from here and link the footbridge up to existing services. He said he would like to discuss this with the members first in order to get a consensus and positive approach in relation to the location of the footbridge.

Resolved that the District Engineer meet with members to agree suitable location for footbridge and agree same before next meeting.

AY9/115 Road Repair at Boherbawn, The Cush and Richardstown, Kildangan.

The members considered the following question in the name of Councillor Wall.
Can the council bring the roads L7065 and L7063 at Boherbawn, the Cush and Richardstown, Kildangan up to a proper standard?

A report from the roads and transportation section was circulated to the members advising that these roads are in the process of being repaired. In the longer term these roads can be included in the 2015 schemes for consideration in the light of available finance.

Councillor Wall welcomed the report.

Resolved that the report be noted.

AY10/115 Questions – Councillor Breslin

Item 12 - Question Councillor Breslin

Can remedial works to undertaken to the roadway and footpaths in Cowpasture, Monasterevin?

A report was circulated to the members from the roads and transportation section advising that any short term remedial works can be undertaken. In the long term this work can be costed and considered in light of the 2015 finances.

Item 13 - Question Councillor Breslin

When will an audit be carried out on the footpaths in Ballyroe and Castleroe estates?

A report was circulated to the members from the roads and transportation section advising that the audit is being undertaken and work can be prioritised and considered in light of the 2015 finances.

Resolved that as Councillor Breslin was not present, it was agreed to ascertain if she wished to defer items 12 and 13 for consideration at the next meeting. The reports were noted.

AY11/115 Safety Programme/Measures for N78

The members considered item 14 and 15 on the agenda together

Item 14 – Question Councillor Keatley

Can the council immediately implement a safety programme in conjunction with the county Joint Policing Committee to help deal with the serious safety issues on the N78?

Item 15 – Question Councillor Miley

Can the council work with the NRA to install safety measures on the N78?

The members considered the following report from the roads and transportation department advising that the N78 is a National Road for which the National Roads Authority (NRA) is responsible. If the members are in agreement a request will issue to that authority and this matter will also be referred to the new County Joint Policing Committee when established. The Roads, Transportation and Public Safety Directorate will assist in the implementation of any safety programme/measures devised by the National Roads Authority (NRA).

Councillor Miley said that the residents are concerned about speeding on this road especially at particular points. He felt that the installation of a permanent camera and gatso vans at these locations would be a great advantage. Councillor Keatley concurred with this and said he had previous motions in terms of safety issues on this route. He said it was the remit of the Gardai as to where the gatso vans are located and he felt that signage would be of great benefit too.

Mr. O'Flaherty felt that the issue of speeding was a matter for enforcement. The Council sets speed limits but it is a matter for the Gardai to enforce. He said that the NRA is the first port of call in respect of the speed cameras.

Resolved to write to the NRA requesting a meeting regarding the implementation of speed cameras and also write to the gardai requesting the presence of the gatso van. Also resolved on the proposal of Councillor Miley, seconded by Councillor Keatley to refer this issue to the Joint Policing Committee.

AY12/115 Footpath Repairs

The following question in the name of Councillor Miley was considered. Can the council prioritise footpaths in need of repair throughout the Athy Municipal District?

A report from the roads and transportation section was circulated to the members advising that a survey is being undertaken in relation to the repair/rehabilitation of footpaths. The work can then be prioritised and considered in light of the 2015 finances.

Councillor Miley welcomed the report and Mr. O'Flaherty asked the members to prioritise the repairs required so that they can be costed.

Resolved that members email their requests to the District Engineer.

AY13/115 Adjourned Motions – Councillor Breslin

Item 17 - Athy Library

That consideration be given to extending the opening hours of Athy Library.

A report was circulated to the members from the Acting County Librarian advising that given ongoing limitations of library staffing resources, Kildare Library and Arts Service at this moment in time is not in a position to extend the opening hours of Athy Library, since the issue of the response in December 2014 the staffing situation has seen further reductions.

Item 18 - Social Housing Strategy

In view of the recent Government announcement allocating funding for social housing, that the council now start a programme of constructing housing for persons, including children, who have specialised housing requirements.

A report was circulated to the members from the housing department advising that following the recent launch of the Social Housing Strategy 2020 the Housing Department is preparing a comprehensive programme in response to meeting the commitments for Kildare. This will be based on direct provision, Rental Accommodation scheme, Social Leasing, acquisitions, Part V, delivery through approved housing bodies and or private sector partners.

The formation of a countywide programme for Kildare will have to have regard to:

- Current trends of integration and concentration of social and private housing.
- Best use of Council assets in terms of matching need with current land holdings given the overriding concern to deliver quality living environments.
- Opportunity for partnerships with approved housing bodies and private development to accelerate delivery times.
- Requirement to limit the scale and size of social developments in any one area.
- Responding to private developers and the need to capture appropriate Part V returns.
- Demand for specialist needs in particular prioritising allocations for homelessness, congregated settlements, travellers, elderly, people with disabilities, those exiting from RAS units in addition to those who have been on the housing waiting list for long periods.
- Resources allocated to project managed and delivery of the programme.

Notwithstanding these concerns where early actions can be identified that will deliver results in the short term such actions will be prioritised.

Resolved as Councillor Breslin was not present it was agreed to ascertain if items 17 and 18 are to be deferred to the next meeting. The reports were noted.

AY14/115 Twinning – Castledermot

The following motion in the name of Councillor Redmond was considered.

That we as a council aim to develop a twinning town or area with Castledermot where the first Irish Parliament was held. This should be done with as much public input as possible and will greatly help the area with tourism.

A report was circulated to the members advising the matter of budgets and twinning will need to be adjudicated upon against the existing commitments and twinning arrangements of Athy Municipal District. The current budget set aside for twinning in Athy being €6,000.

Councillor Redmond referred to the possibility of twinning Castldermot with a European town and suggested holding a meeting with the twinning group as there is a sufficient budget to fund this. Councillor Keatley felt it is necessary to look at a strategy for the whole area and not just individual towns and this could be discussed with the Athy Twinning Committee. Councillor Miley supported the motion and felt that twinning would be beneficial but that we should broaden it out to include the Shackleton issue. He said that Castledermot was one the most historic places in the Country.

Resolved to discuss this issue at the meeting to be organised to discuss enhancing the Ernest Shackleton experience in the South of the County and invite Athy Twinning Group to this meeting as well.

AY15/115 Accommodation for Athy Rowing and Canoe Club

It was agreed to take items 20 and 21 on the agenda together

Item 20 Motion – Councillor Wall

That Athy Municipal District immediately engages with Athy Rowing and Canoe Club to allow them locate a temporary and renewable accommodation for the club on the council car park adjacent to the Dominican church.

Item 21 Motion – Councillor Breslin

That the council enters into negotiations with Athy Rowing and Canoe Club to permit the club to place a club house on the council car park at Dominican Lane, Athy.

A report from Mr. Simon Wallace, Parks Superintendent was circulated to the members advising that discussions will be held with Athy Rowing Club in conjunction with the Roads and Planning Departments in relation to any issues regarding a location for a club house.

Councillor Wall welcomed the report and asked if the members were happy to grant the club permission to use the car park on a temporary basis. He said that they are a progressive club with over 100 members and the car park is used very little. Although Councillor Dalton supported the motion, he too has received a request from the Tri Athy Club looking for similar use and he felt we needed to be careful to be equal to all clubs. Councillor Keatley supported both motions and referred to the growth in membership of the rowing club and encouraged the Council to help them.

The District Engineer said that, in the past, he had had preliminary meetings with the Dragon Club who wanted somewhere to store the dragon boat during the winter. He suggested that they store it in an enclosed location.

Requests from all the relevant clubs must be considered in the long term, is it going to be permanent, who is going to maintain it. He noted that this is an area of conservation and planning would need to be consulted as it may also be necessary to look at the riverbank to facilitate the boats. In relation to a query from the Cathaoirleach about receiving a deputation from Inland Waterways regarding the installation of jetties on the far side of the river, the Meeting Administrator advised that the Inland Waterways should write to the Cathaoirleach first requesting receipt of their deputation and make submissions in advance.

Resolved that the municipal district members receive a deputation from Inland Waterways at the next meeting.

AY16/115 Capital Assistance Programme Muiriosa Foundation (in Moore Abbey)

The members considered the following question in the name of Councillor Redmond. Can the council detail when they applied for funding for the six bedroom house for the Muiriosa foundation (in Moore Abbey) from the Department of the Environment, Community and Local Government and what was the department's response, if the documents of the communications between the Department of Environment, Community and Local Government and the council can be released on this issue?

The members considered a report from the housing department advising that the council has held a number of discussions with Muiriosa Housing Association in respect of the delivery of a six bedroom unit and the matter has also been discussed with the Department of Environment, Community and Local Government. The council was not satisfied with certain aspects of the project to recommend its approval to the Department of Environment, Community and Local Government and advised all parties as to the requirements of the scheme. The Housing Department is willing to meet with any parties interested in progressing Capital Assistance Schemes that can be funded in accordance with the provisions of the scheme.

The council supported a separate application by Muiriosa Housing Association through the Capital Assistance Scheme for a property at Rathangan to meet special needs which was funded by the Department of Environment in 2013.

Councillor Redmond expressed satisfaction with this report but was disappointed however at the failure to release the documentation he requested.

Resolved that the report be noted.

AY17/115 Illegal Encampments

The members considered the following motion in the name of Councillor Keatley. That the council immediately investigate the issues that have developed in Monastereven as a result of illegal encampments in the vicinity of Barrow Close housing estate.

A report from the planning and economic development section was circulated to the members advising that the issues raised by Councillor Keatley concerning alleged unauthorised development on a site in the vicinity of Barrow Close are being investigated and if unauthorised development is taking place, appropriate follow-up will be undertaken by the Planning section.

Councillor Keatley advised that further incidents had taken place involving the Gardai. He said he and the residents of the area are extremely concerned. He went on to say that he had had conversations with the planning department and was not satisfied that the Council has taken action as they should have, however he is satisfied that there is a plan in place with the gardai to deal with this actively and he said he would be following up on this issue himself with both housing and planning departments who needed to be more proactive. Councillors Wall and Miley supported the motion.

Resolved that the report be noted.

AY18/115 Strategy for new regional aid classification for South Kildare

The members considered the following question in the name of Councillor Keatley. Can the council request the Local Enterprise Office to develop a strategy to take advantage of the new regional aid classification of the south of the county?

A report from the planning and economic development section was circulated to the members advising that LEO will not have any access to funding under the Regional Aid Scheme. It is essentially targeted at Enterprise Ireland and IDA clients, not the micro-enterprise Sector. LEO will, therefore, not be formulating any strategy in this regard.

Councillor Keatley said he would be following this up with the Local Enterprise Office and advised that a regional aid scheme would benefit all enterprise in the south of the County. He was concerned that locally the Council are not taking advantage of the new status that we have been given through Enterprise Ireland and the IDA. He

felt that it was something we needed help working on over the next few years to encourage businesses into the south of the county.

Resolved that the report be noted.

AY19/115 Proposed Community Garden for Monasterevin

The members considered the following question in the name of Councillor Wall.

Can the council update its members on the proposed community garden for Monasterevin.

A report from Mr. Joe Boland, Director of Service, Water and Environmental Services section was also circulated to the members advising that it is proposed to commence this work in partnership with the local community who are supplying the stone as well as most of the fill material for the walkways. The Council, for its part, will put in the foundations, construct the wall and walkways as well as configuring the site. This will cost in the region of €4,500 and the formal approval of the municipal district to this expenditure will be requested and it should commence shortly.

Councillor Wall welcomed the report saying it is a great project the town of Monasterevin.

Resolved on the proposal of Councillor Wall, seconded by Councillor Keatley that expenditure be approved for the community garden.

AY20/115 WiFi – Athy Town

The members considered the following motion in the name of Councillor Redmond. That this council investigates (citing Drogheda in County Louth) a free WiFi town in Athy. The initial cost to get the same service has dropped considerably since my initial motion in September 2009.

A report from Mr. Bernard Higgins, Head of IT and Procurement was circulated to the members giving the background to the provision of Wifi in Drogheda and outlined the merits of free Wifi in the County subject to the availability of funding and technical resources to procure, design, implement and support such an initiative. He felt it

would be prudent to examine this on a county-wide basis with the aid of LCDC, and recommended that the LCDC consider the development of a countywide Wifi strategy as part of the LECF for County Kildare.

Councillor Redmond said that there is a cost of €750 to get an assessment of the town and then there would be an initial cost of €5000 to make Athy a pilot WiFi town. He asked the members to agree to the expenditure of €750 for the assessment. The members supported the motion but asked that it be referred to the Enterprise Board for investigation first.

Resolved to initially refer this matter to the Enterprise Board for investigation and update members in due course.

The meeting concluded.
