## **Section 1          Introduction**

### **1.1          Introduction**

This report focuses on the submissions and observations received from the public and statutory bodies following the publication of the proposed variation No.3 of the County Development Plan 2011-2017. The reason for the proposed variation is to include provisions to address the issues of high tension power lines and set out the policies regarding the future development of this infrastructure over the period of the Plan.

### **1.2          Legislative Requirements**

Under the Planning and Development Acts 2000 - 2014, the Chief Executive is required to prepare a report on the submissions and observations received in respect of the proposed variation, including submissions made by the Minister of the Environment, Community and Local Government, the NTA and the Mid-East Regional Authority, to respond to the issues raised and to make recommendations in relation to the proposed variation, taking into account the proper planning and sustainable development of the area, the statutory obligations of the local authority and relevant policies or objectives of the Government or any Minister of Government.

### **1.3          Public Consultation**

The proposed variation No. 3 of the Kildare County Development Plan 2011-2017 was placed on public display from the 7<sup>th</sup> May until 4<sup>th</sup> June 2014. Copies were made available for inspection at Aras Chill Dara in Naas, and at the following public libraries during their usual opening hours: Athy, Ballitore, Castledermot, Celbridge, Clane, Clocha Rince, Kilcock, Kilcullen, Kildare, Leixlip, Maynooth, Monasterevin, Naas, Newbridge and Rathangan. The proposed variation and all related documents were also available to view on the County Council's website.

Copies of the Proposed Variation No. 3 of Kildare County Development Plan 2011-2017 and associated documents were also sent to a range of statutory bodies including government departments and other agencies as required by the Planning and Development Acts.

In total 4116 submissions were received on the proposed variation during the statutory period. Due to the volume of submissions received and in accordance with Section 249(2) of the Planning and Development Acts 2000-2014 an acknowledgement to the submissions received was placed in the Liffey Champion, The Leinster Leader and The Leinster Express on 13th June 2014. All written submissions are summarised in this report. The response of the Chief Executive is given to the issues raised.

### **1.4          Content of Chief Executive Report**

The Chief Executive's Report must:

1. List the persons or bodies who made submissions.
2. Summarise the issues raised by the Minister and thereafter other persons or bodies
3. Summarise the issues and recommendations made by the DTA and the Regional Authority.

4. Give the response of the Chief Executive's on the issues raised. In this regard the Chief Executive's response must take into account:

- a) The proper planning and sustainable development of the area
- b) The statutory obligations of any local authority in the area
- c) Any relevant policies or objectives of the Government or of any Minister of the Government.

### **1.5 Next Steps**

Following consideration of the Chief Executive's report the Members may, as they consider appropriate, by resolution, make the variation which would, if made, be a material alteration with or without further modification or they may refuse to make it. If the Members decide to materially amend the proposed variation, a further period of public consultation will be necessary.

A Screening for Strategic Environmental Assessment and a Screening Report for Appropriate Assessment accompanies the proposed variation No.3 of the Kildare County Development Plan 2011-2017. The screening report for SEA determined that the variation would have no significant impact on the environment. The screening report for AA determined that there would be no significant effects on any Natura 2000 sites as a result of the variation.

If the Planning Authority engages in a further round of public consultation for proposed material amendments to variation No.3 of the County Development Plan, the planning authority must screen any proposed material changes to determine if an SEA or AA or both are required of any of the material alterations and what period is necessary for the carrying out of any SEA or AA. This screening, and if necessary the SEA or AA, must be carried out before proceeding to the public consultation period.

The public display period of any material alterations is a minimum of 4 weeks during which submissions with respect to the proposed material alterations will be taken into account before the variation is made. Following the public consultation period a further Chief Executive's Report is prepared and the members must consider the proposed variation, the alterations to the proposed variation, any environmental reports and the Chief Executive's Report on any submissions received and decide whether to make the variation with or without the proposed alterations.

In making a variation, the elected representatives, acting in the interests of the common good and the proper planning and sustainable development of the area, must, in accordance with the 'Code of Conduct for Councillors' prepared under the Local Government Act 2001, carry out their duties in a transparent manner, must follow due process and must make their decisions based on relevant considerations.

Section 13(7) of the Planning and Development Act 2000, as amended, states that the Members of the Council are restricted to:

- considering the proper planning and sustainable development of the area to which the development plan relates
- the statutory obligations of the local authority, and
- any relevant policies or objectives for the time being of the Government or any Minister of the Government.
